From the President

Some aspects of the last 12 months have continued on from the previous year. An ongoing feature has been the change in our visual identity, which started with the decision in 2016 to adopt a new logo for the Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Incorporated. Both the Melbourne Friends and Cranbourne Friends will have part of the RBGV's new logo. The Melbourne Friends, as that is how we will be known, will use the leaves of the Oak and Moreton Bay Fig, whereas Cranbourne Friends will use the leaves of the Eucalyptus and Acacia. It is a significant change from our logo of the past 30-odd years, but our core purpose of providing support to the RBGV remains unaltered.

A new look for the future has also encouraged us to look back to our past, with the instigation of an oral history project to capture the memories of some of our very first members. This will be a valuable resource for the Friends and one that we can build on in the future. Another new look is in the production of this Annual Report, with the introduction of photographs to enliven the content.

Our overall membership numbers unfortunately remain static at around the 2,500 mark and much of the focus this past year has been on looking at ways to encourage new members while also retaining current members. The Photography Group has been an exciting introduction which has gone from strength to strength. Several new members have joined so that they can be part of it and we look forward to seeing more of their work. Meanwhile, other enthusiastic members continue to provide a rich variety of classes, workshops, events and gardening skills, from botanical art to indigo dyeing, from walks to talks, gardening groups and plant sales. Members of the Friends are able to come together on these occasions, but success relies on the many hours of voluntary work put in by those members involved in producing each event. We also greatly value the work of our members who volunteer their time in the Friends' Office throughout the year. We thank you all for your time and commitment.

The commitment of one particular member over many years to the Melbourne Gardens, and to the Friends, was recognised in the Australia Day Honours List with Jenny Happell being awarded an OAM for her work with the Garden's Camellia collection. Special thanks for years of voluntary service go to Janet Moritz and Lee Tregloan, who have both recently retired from long-held positions.

With sadness though, we record the deaths of two long-time members in recent months, Golda Isaac and Diana Plant, both of whom devoted much time and energy to the Friends. Golda was a founding member who delighted everyone with her enthusiasm and was instrumental in establishing the direction of the Friends from the outset.

A first-time event held last October was the inaugural Botanic & Rare Plant Fair, where the Melbourne Friends combined with RBGV and the Diggers Club to stage a showcase of rare plants for sale. This included the plants propagated by the Growing Friends for their Spring Plant Sale, which was a major feature of the weekend. The Growing Friends had an excellent result but the weekend generally was not helped by a burst of atrocious weather. The event is to be staged again this spring, so an even better result for the Growing Friends will be hoped for.

Our financial support towards the RBGV continues via our Trust Fund and we look forward to the completion of the refurbishment of the Visitor Centre, towards which we have provided a donation of \$70,000. Support for the aims and objectives of the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria, Melbourne Gardens, remains the driving force behind the Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Inc., and we look forward to sharing more exciting projects together.

The Council of the Friends

Six Council meetings were held during the year on alternate months commencing August 2016. Regular reports presented to Council included reports from the Director and Chief Executive of the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria covering key developments in the Melbourne and Cranbourne Gardens, and reports from the Executive and Finance Committee and Operations Committee.

At the Annual General Meeting held on 21 November 2016, Mary Ward was elected President. Lynsey Poore and Cathy Trinca were elected Vice-Presidents, Mark Anderson re-elected Treasurer and Jan Rosenberg, Richard Smith and Robert Wright ordinary members of Council.

Council members form the committee of management of the Friends, which is charged with controlling and managing the Friends' business and affairs. The powers of Council are defined by the Rules and the Act. These give Council the authority to exercise all the powers and functions of the Friends, except those reserved for general meetings.

Executive and Finance Committee

The Committee, comprising the Council's office bearers, is usually convened in the period leading up to Council meetings. The primary role of the Committee is to examine and consider the financial and business affairs of the Friends and report to Council as appropriate.

Administration

The past year has been a busy one for the Friends' office staff and volunteers. The office employs three staff members, all on a part-time basis, who manage various roles.

We are very grateful for the untiring support of the volunteers who come to assist every week. They have filled the role of receptionist as well as carrying out general office and banking procedures. With their help, the office provides a wonderful team environment. Our thanks must go to all those who contribute to the success of the tasks undertaken in the office.

Appointment of Auditors

The firm of DFK Kidsons was appointed for the 2016/17 financial year to audit both the Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Incorporated and Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Trust Fund.

The reports are included in this Annual Report.

Financial Results

The financial position for the financial year ending 30 June 2017 was an operating surplus of \$51,380 which is \$21,695 ahead of budget. The revenue was \$487,632 which \$20,727 ahead of budget. Expenditure was \$436,252 which is marginally better than budget.

There are no major concerns with the financial performance of the individual activities.

There were a number of non-budgeted activities undertaken in the second half of the financial year, e.g. the History of the Friends project and improvements to the Whirling Room Studio.

The total assets of the Friends as at 30 June 2017 were \$502,817, an increase of \$54,007 over the 2016 value of \$448,810. This increase is mostly represented by an increase in cash held. Cash and term deposits totalled \$471,642. Liabilities were stable at \$156,847, resulting in net assets of \$345,970.

Expenditure on capital items was \$10,963 which purchased a heating and cooling system for the Plant Craft Cottage, as planned and agreed in the previous year.

At the conclusion of the 2016/17 financial year, the Friends are in a sustainable financial position. The objective for 2018 is to maintain revenue and manage costs in order to achieve a conservative (\$20,000) surplus on an ongoing basis.

Grants to the Gardens

Grants totalling \$59,212 were allocated to the Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria, Melbourne Gardens in the past financial year. This amount comprises grants paid by both the Friends and the Trust Fund. The grants have contributed to the Visitor Centre refurbishment, scholarships, the purchase of artworks from the Art of Botanical Illustration 2016, the Helen McLellan Research Grant and general purpose, including maintenance.

The total value of Grants from the Friends to the Gardens since 1985 exceeds \$2.519,000.

Grants Committee

The Grants Committee works to coordinate the funding of the Friends to the Gardens across all sources. The Committee comprises the President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, and the four Trustees of the Trust Fund.

The Committee meets throughout the year to evaluate the applications and to determine the source of funding of the grants. Significant grant proposals are discussed with the Director and Chief Executives of the RBGV prior to a decision being made.

Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Trust Fund

The annual report and audited financial statements for the Trust Fund are on pages 12 to 24 of this document. The Chairman of Trustees, an ex-officio member of Council, regularly reports to Council on the Trust Fund performance and other related issues.

Friends' Scholarship Scheme

From 2007/08, the Trust has funded scholarships for RBGV staff members to enable them to further their professional development. To date, \$108,090 has been awarded to successful applicants.

Friends' Helen McLellan Research Grant

A grant of \$19,942 was made available from funds in 2016/17 to facilitate ongoing research. This brings the total of grants funded under this scheme to \$112,732.

Operations Committee

The Operations Committee has met bi-monthly on alternate months to the Council. It has been decided that from 2018, the committee will meet four times a year.

The committee membership includes the conveners of all the Friends' committees, the Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, the Editor of *Botanic News*, the Director Melbourne Gardens and a representative of the RBGV Public Programs Volunteers.

The Operations Committee provides a forum in which the conveners report and discuss their programs, activities and events. It also provides time for discussion of new ideas, and to that end a 'think tank' was held in May under the direction of a facilitator. It was a valuable exercise as new ideas that engage both long-serving and new members were put forward. Some of these ideas have been implemented. Thanks must go to all the conveners for their continuing dedication to their groups and in trying to recruit new members and to have meaningful activities and events for all members of the Friends.

Botanical Illustrators



In October 2016, the Friends' major biennial art exhibition 'The Art of Botanical Illustration' was held in Domain House. Organised by the Botanical Illustrators Group, this was the most successful exhibition in terms of percentage of paintings sold since 2006. Seventy-five framed paintings and a further 125 unframed works were sold. It is only through the efforts of the Friends' volunteers and office staff that such an important exhibition is possible. The exhibition was opened by Anthony Howard QC, standing in for the Governor who was unwell. Once again, Celia Rosser was on hand to award the medals named in her honour to Dianne Emery, Paul Rovis and Marta Salamon. Honourable Mentions went to Vicki Philipson, Sandra Sanger, Jennifer Taranto and Merle McIntyre. Works by Dianne

Emery, Terry Napier and Jennifer Taranto were selected for the State Botanical Collection, and Jennifer Taranto's exquisite painting of an eggplant won the People's Choice Award. The exhibition reached a wider audience with the theme of 'A New Direction'. Whilst traditional botanical illustration will still be the bedrock of future exhibitions, there was certainly interest in the more unconventional works.

Jo Brownell has stepped down as Convener of the Friends' Botanical Illustrators after being involved with the exhibition (and on the Committee) since its inception in 1992. The new Convener is Andrew Carr who curated the Friends' natural history exhibition in 2015.

Botanical Art Classes:

The Friends continue to hold classes in botanical illustration in the Whirling Room Studio seven days a week. The teaching year is divided into four eight-week terms, with seven classes held on weekdays, one in the evening and two at the weekend. Our three tutors, Dianne Emery, Mali Moir and Helen Burrows, all have a devoted following due to their fine teaching and excellent rapport with their students.

Workshops:

Students new to botanical illustration are always encouraged to start with a four-day Beginners' Workshop. These are held regularly during term breaks and are usually fully booked. Beginners' Workshops are taught by the Friends' three tutors. Many of their students go on to enrol for term classes.

A series of workshops on subjects of special interest are also taught during term breaks. Visiting tutors are often engaged to teach these workshops. The following were conducted during the year:

Events

The 2016-2017 year saw many sold-out events which is a demonstration that the Events Committee is providing activities that our members enjoy and find stimulating.

A second-hand gardening book sale was a great success, netting \$2,200. Our thanks go to all who contributed books and for the tireless efforts of the committee and Friends who pitched in to sort, price and sell the books.

Much interest is being expressed in the trip to Singapore planned for 2018. Our tour already has 20 confirmed bookings



Our Insider Walks continue to gain momentum with one of the most memorable being the Chocolate and Spice walk, which started with hot spicy chocolate in Mueller Hall before the group was taken on a fascinating adventure into the spicy curiosities of the Gardens.

A review of the year would not be complete without mention of our day trips. On Valentine's Day, Friends and guests who travelled by bus to Coriyule on the Bellarine Peninsula were treated to a house and garden tour and talk by the owners, followed

by a picnic lunch in the garden. The surprise stop on the return journey was the astonishing Roraima Nursery at Lara, which delighted everyone. It is a 'must do' for gardeners with an interest in arid landscape plants.

The day of our autumn self-drive to the Dandenongs was wet and cold with a chill wind that subdued even the hardiest traveller. Hot scones and coffee started us off, followed by guided visits to several different gardens and a sit-down lunch at the Ferny Creek Horticultural Society made sure our day was utterly memorable.

One of our most fascinating illustrated talks of the year was about Coombe – The Melba Estate. A beautifully illustrated and presented story filled with unknown facts and anecdotes.

Our annual Christmas cocktail party was held once again at Gardens House and was a very enjoyable and convivial evening in a beautiful and peaceful setting.

The Ramble to the Blue Lotus Garden in Warburton was a surprise for all who attended with the sheer beauty and size of these magnificent flowers.



Growing Friends

As always, the plant sales to the public in Autumn and Spring were the focus of the Growing Friends efforts throughout the year. This was especially so this year as both events were departures from the traditional format. The Spring Sale was held in conjunction with the Botanic & Rare Plant Fair, which was organised jointly by Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria, Melbourne Gardens, Diggers Club and the Melbourne Friends of Royal Botanic Gardens Victoria and took place on the Observatory Lawn. The numerous willing staff and volunteers ensured that the event was well prepared and planned except that there was of course no control of the weather, which was atrocious. On Saturday there were continual heavy rain showers and a cold wind and Sunday was not much better, but still a steady stream of hardy gardeners attended each day. In the long run, despite the weather, the event proved very successful not only for the Growing Friends, who achieved an all-time record income, but also for most of the 20 or so other stall holders/exhibitors. The Autumn Sale was in the usual location, on the Acmena Lawn. However

the revised layout of the lawn and the garden beds around it allowed the Growing Friends to rearrange the plant sale area to create more open space. This continued and heightened the "fair like" effect of the previous sales.

Attendance and income from the Nursery Sale Days, on the first Friday of each month, have continued to increase, possibly due to the fact that they have become established events. As with previous years the individual results have varied dramatically due largely to

Helping Hands



The team of volunteer gardeners continued to maintain E Gate and Eastern Lodges with support from RBGV coordinators.

Geoffrey Kneebone, who led the group since late 2014, retired during the year and is greatly missed. Renowned for his encyclopaedic knowledge of gardening and his dry humour, Geoffrey also looked after the garden at Gate Lodge for more than fifteen years.

Information Technology and Equipment

A review of Information systems, in particular the current system iMIS, was carried out by Mali Wilson. In summary it was recommended that:

- 1. An ICT (Information and Communication Technology) specialist is needed to provide technical support on an on-going basis.
- 2. The Internet speed provided by the current Telstra ADSL is not sufficient to support what is intended to be an on-line application. The only potential solution to this issue is transferring to a 4G mobile Internet connection from Telstra.
- 3. It is recommended that the Friends' Council spend some time viewing other application alternatives available to provide an on-line solution together with a computerised solution to the existing business processes. Several such systems are available, but it should be noted that none of these applications will be precisely what is needed to manage the Friends' offerings, and it will be a matter of identifying those with the least issues. In carrying out this review it may be found that the issues found in the current iMIS solution are indeed the least problematic.

While deciding on these recommendations, it was suggested that more work can be done identifying how iMIS might be better used in its current form.

Council endorsed the above recommendations aimed at improving productivity.

Membership and Marketing

Member numbers have remained fairly steady over the last year with new membership applications maintaining overall numbers. We have introduced a range of unique opportunities for new members to become engaged with the Melbourne Gardens and increase their interest and sense of belonging, including free behind the scenes tours.

In addition to the many and varied benefits which members can access within the Gardens, we very much appreciate those organisations and businesses who so generously continue to provide members with discounts and services. More details of these benefits and opportunities are shown on the Friends' website.

We wish to thank Lee Tregloan for her service as Convener of the committee and editor of eNews. Lee has retired from these roles, and we shall miss her enthusiastic support.

More than 1500 household members receive *eNews*. Content includes membership updates and benefits, reminders of upcoming events, news items and topics of special interest.

The committee maintains the Friends' website, keeping it up to date and topical. Publicity for Friends' events is provided to the general and online media, and the Friends maintain a Facebook page with almost 1900 likes and followers.

With the retirement of Lee Tregloan as Convener of the committee and editor of *eNews*, we have welcomed Ingrid Casson to the role of editor of *eNews*.

Photo Group

The new Photo Group was established in December 2016 and attracted 35 members. A survey was created to discover areas of interest and when people could attend. A meeting was held in April when the results of the survey were discussed and from this the 2017 program was developed.

The first photographic activity was the 'Camellia Walk' held on 21 June. This was most successful with 15 members attending and the results may be viewed on the Photo Group's FRBGM Flickr page

The Photo Group FRBGM Flickr page was established in January 2017 and has 16 members with some 640 photographs of the gardens.

The 2017 activity program will alternate between a meeting in Mueller Hall and a photo walk through the Gardens. The walks will start from the Rose Pavilion near Gardens House.

Plant Craft Cottage



In the 35 years of its life as a craft centre, Plant Craft Cottage has achieved an international reputation for its innovative use of plants. Some of the original members who have been loyal to their craft groups for many years now find it increasingly difficult to visit the Gardens, or spend a day doing roster duty. Several groups have closed and it has been necessary to reduce the opening hours. A concerted effort is being made to attract new volunteers to overcome these issues.

In spite of retirements, the regular scheduled program of events throughout the year has been maintained. A two-day shibori workshop was held by the Natural Dye group in February; a Basketry workshop in May

and School Holiday workshops in April, July and October were well attended.

Record numbers attended the Melbourne Open House weekend when the heritage listed cottage was once again part of this event.

Several guided walks have finished with morning tea at PCC and a New Members Welcome was held in the courtyard on a sunny autumn day in May.

Plans are in hand to encourage Friends to make wider use of the cottage – to visit, browse, enjoy the garden, or participate in a workshop.



Publications and Editorial Advisory Committee

Our quarterly magazine, *Botanic News*, is the only form of regular communication which can reach all members of the Friends, as a significant proportion have not yet advised us of an email address.

During the year both the computer hardware and software were upgraded. This made the job of the editor of *Botanic News*, Meg Miller, less stressful by enabling her to work either at Gate Lodge or at home. It also ensured that the system was compatible with other programs.

The year also saw the number of pages in each issue of *Botanic News* increased from 20 to 24 with no significant increase in cost for printing or mailing. As quite a proportion of the magazine is taken up with information about future events, the increase enabled more substantial articles to be published as well. We are grateful for all the authors from both within and outside the Gardens for the wide range of topics covered.

Meg Miller is also responsible for the production of the annual calendar, the Christmas card and all the other cards sold by the Friends, using images painted by our members. We are very appreciative of the enormous amount of time and expertise Meg puts into all these tasks.

Volunteers

This year we were called upon to find volunteers to help staff Jeannie Baker's *Circle* exhibition, which ran for three months in Domain House. In conjunction with the RBGV Volunteer Coordinator, Jane Griffin, enough people were recruited to cover the 430 hours of the exhibition's duration. Many volunteers found out about this through our advertisements placed with Glen Eira and Boroondara volunteer organisations. We are using these organisations for other volunteering vacancies that are unusually difficult to fill. *eNews* is also an excellent vehicle for letting Friends know about opportunities.

Our volunteering handbook states that 'while volunteering provides substantial benefits to society, importantly it also provides significant benefits to the volunteers themselves. We believe that the personal benefits of volunteering need to be recognised and fostered.' We have many and varied volunteering opportunities and do encourage our members to become more involved by volunteering.

Volunteers are highly valued by the Friends. The contribution of all those who have helped us during the past year is acknowledged with much gratitude.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF FRIENDS OF THE ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS, MELBOURNE INCORPORATED

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of the Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens, Melbourne Inc., which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2017, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, and the declaration by Council members.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act (Vic) 2012.

The Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne Inc (the Friends) is a Not for Profit Association and has prepared the financial statements in accordance with the requirements regarding Not for Profit entities as contained in Australian Accounting standards. The Association has adopted Accounting Standard AASB 1053 "Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards". Under this Accounting Standard, the Association is classified as a Tier 2 entity and required to apply the recognition and measurement requirements of all Accounting Standards but substantially reduced disclosure requirements. The disclosure requirements of Accounting Standard AASB 7 on financial instruments are not disclosed in the financial report.

The Council has determined that the accounting policies adopted are appropriate to meet the needs of the members. These financial statements do not conform with International Financial Reporting Standards.

The financial report is prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs, and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following material accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period, unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

(a) Income tax

The Friends is a non-profit association exempt from income tax under Section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated over the useful life of the asset to the Friends commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

(c) Employee entitlements

Provision is made for the Friends' liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries and annual leave that will be settled after one year have been measured at the nominal amount. Other employee entitlements payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those entitlements.

Contributions are made by the Friends to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as an expense when incurred. The Friends have no legal obligation to provide benefits to employees on retirement.

(d) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon delivery of goods to customers.

Revenue from the rendering of services is recognised upon the delivery of the service to customers and members.

Membership revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial asset.

Other revenue is brought to account as income on an accrual basis.

(e) Unearned revenue

Membership revenue received before balance date in relation to subsequent financial years is brought to account as a liability.

(f) Cash

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand, at bank and on deposit.

(g) Comparative figures

Where required, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(h) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

FRIENDS OF THE ROYAL BOTANIC GARDENS MELBOURNE TRUST FUND ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

Introduction

The Friends of the Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne Trust Fund (the Fund) is an endorsed tax concession charity and deductible gift recipient body under taxation legislation. It was established in 1986 to conserve, protect and foster the development of the Royal Botanic Gardens Melbourne and the National Herbarium of Victoria (RBG).

Originally, the Fund sought to encourage tax-deductible donations; and until 2008, save for a couple of small size bequests, the Fund's income was mostly generated by ad hoc donations. In 2008, however, following receipt of the late Helen McLellan bequest of some \$2.5 million, the Trustees, after consultation with the major stakeholders, decided to create a "corpus" from that bequest, which prudently invested, would become a continuing source of distributable funds to support RBG.

Grants to RBG from the Fund since 2009 have totalled nearly \$980,000, and they are expected to reach \$140,000 in 2017/18. In recent years, the Fund has been the major source of grants to RBG, and is expected to continue in this role.

The Fund's financial objectives are to maintain the value of the corpus in real terms while generating a level of income consistent with the legally mandated minimum annual distributions to RBG.

Government Regulation

The Fund is subject to the legislated guidelines for public ancillary funds that came into force on 1 January 2012. Government oversight of the Fund's activities is undertaken through the Australian Taxation Office and the Australian Charities and Not for Profit Commission to whom annual returns are submitted. The Fund complies with all regulatory requirements, which, among other things, require it to distribute 4% of the value of its Opening Net Assets to RBG each year.

Stakeholder co-ordination framework

As one of the stakeholders in the financial support of RBG, the Fund is part of a framework designed to ensure effective co-ordination between stakeholders. That framework is comprised of the Friends' Council, the Trustees of the Trust Fund and the RBG; all are legally independent, but their joint endeavours are closely and continuingly co-ordinated to achieve optimal benefit for the Gardens.

The Director/CEO of the RBG and the Chairman of Trustees are both ex-officio members of the Friends' Council and attend meetings of Council. In addition, the Grants Committee, which is comprised of the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Friends and of the four Trustees of the Trust Fund, meet, as required, to align grant making policies, which also benefit from scheduled face to face meetings with the Director of the RBG.

Investment Strategy

A steady, sustainable annual income flow to fund grants to the RBG is a primary requirement. Accordingly, the Fund's investment policy aims for as high a level of distributable sums as is prudently achievable consistent with maintaining, in the longer term, the real value and capacity of the corpus.

Strategically, the Fund is targeting a return from income and capital, but before annual drawings and costs, of 4% above the Consumer Price Index (CPI) over a market cycle. The guidelines for asset allocation are broadly, 30% for Cash and fixed interest assets, and 70% for equities, both Australian and International.

Prudent diversification across asset classes and securities is employed to mitigate negative outcomes; and investments are selected with a view to avoiding a negative return after costs more than once in any five-year period. However, market conditions vary from year to year, and deviations from the strategic targets may occur from time to time.

Wealth Management Advice and related activities

Since 2009, the Trustees have been assisted by UBS, and more recently, by Crestone Wealth Management, and particularly by Mr Tim James, who has been the same Client Advisor over the entire period, including the transition from UBS to Crestone. The Trustees wish to record their appreciation of Mr James' support and thoughtful management of the portfolio.

The transition to Crestone occurred when UBS withdrew from the field in 2016, following, in effect, a management buy-out.

In 2017, the Trustees undertook a review of the wealth management advice function. They called for expressions of interest to service the needs of the Fund from reputable wealth management advisors as well as Crestone. The offers, including the relative performance of all involved were carefully considered. In the end, however, the Trustees did not find any compelling reasons to change advisors.

Financial statements

Audited detailed financial statements are at pages 30 to 37 of this report.

Total Revenue in 2016/17 totalled \$316,875 compared to \$181,107 the previous year. This was a rise of \$135,768 or about 75%. This was largely due both to a bequest of \$57,500 from the late Professor Robyn Sharwood – a long time chair of the Fund, and a turn around in Realised Profit on investments of nearly \$88,000 (from a loss in 2015/16 to a profit in 2016/17). Except for a reduction of some \$6,000 in Interest received, the other components were largely unchanged from the previous year.

Total expenditure in 2016/17 totalled \$56,986 – about \$8,000 higher than the year before, and was due mainly to a corresponding rise in management fees. That rise in management fees reflects the increase in the portfolio between the years.

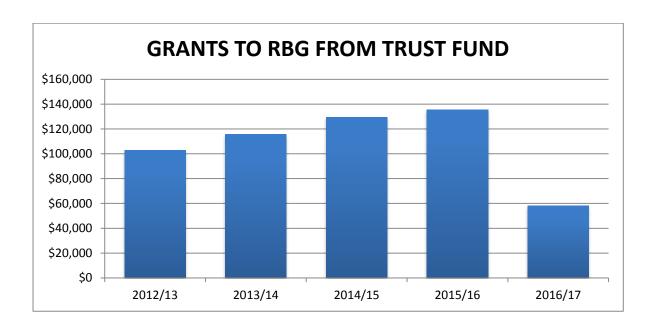
Grants paid to RBG for the 2016/17 years totalled \$58,149 compared to \$135,700 in the previous year. The decline in grants paid resulted from delays in getting the Fern Gully Rest House Restoration project ready to be undertaken on time.

The Comprehensive income of the Fund for the 2016/17 year rose strongly from a loss of \$118,103 in the previous year to a positive \$401,780 in the current year. This strong turnaround reflects, in addition to the rise in revenue mentioned earlier, a strong Unrealised Increase in investments as well as a reduction in grants made to the RBG.

At 30 June 2017, the value of the Fund's net assets was \$3,675,220 compared to \$3,272,440 at the same time, in the previous financial year.

Grants to RBG

The chart below shows the grants made to RBG in each of the five years from 2012/13 to \$2016/17.



Total grants to RBG paid from the Trust Fund over the five years have totalled \$541,675.

Performance of the Fund

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(c) Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial asset.

Other revenue is brought to account as income on an accrual basis.

(d) Cash

For the purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash includes cash on hand, at bank and on deposit.

(e) Comparative figures

Where required, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.
