FROM THE PRESIDENT

The year of celebration, 1996, has begun and it is already clear that the sesquicentenary of our Gardens and the centenary of the death of von Mueller is going to be historic in very many ways.

The inclusion of the three-hectare Observatory site in the Gardens, and the conversion of the old buildings into a Garden Gate precinct with the aid of a \$2.9 million funding grant from the State Government, will be realised this year; the Gardens will have a new entrance opposite the Shrine, a new forecourt, and a host of new features to welcome and assist the visitor.

The Friends, of course, are vitally involved, not only in the celebrations themselves, but in changes of location and operation.

The office will move some time this year to the Entrance Lodge right at the new main gate; arrangements have been made for the Growing Friends to relocate in the Gardens' nursery area, and the Botanical Illustrators seem likely to have access to new facilities in the Observatory buildings.

All this is most welcome, coming on top of the dramatic developments in the Gardens themselves over the past three years, and the Friends share the enthusiasm of the Director, Board and staff for these further enhancements to the prestige and attractions of the Royal Botanic Gardens.

It is pleasing to report a steady increase in membership; the Gardens' 150th birthday provides a great opportunity for each Friend to recruit a new member.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The year of the 150th Anniversary of the Royal Botanic Gardens has arrived and the celebrations have started! Planning for the Sesquicentenary has been under way for three years, guided by a Board Committee chaired by Mrs Marian Brookes and managed by our consultant, Nancy Staub. Something will be happening in every month of the year - there is a remarkable range of events on the program, from exhibitions to gardeners' talks, behind-thescenes tours, collecting expeditions and botanical conferences. We are especially pleased that the Friends, Voluntary Guides and the Plant Craft Cottage are all contributing major events to the program.

The celebrations commenced with a special function for current RBG staff at Gardens House on 8 February. The Director thanked the staff for their enthusiastic participation in the planning and preparations for the 150th

Anniversary, and honoured the essential role which they and their many predecessors have played in caring for one of Victoria's greatest assets. A special anniversary dinner took place in the grounds of Gardens House on 24 February, followed on Sunday 25 February by our Foundation Day celebrations launched by the Governor of Victoria and the Minister for Conservation and Environment. Many thousands of visitors enjoyed strolling through the Gardens - which looked magnificent - and watching the entertainment, eating at the food stalls, studying the outdoor Sculpture Exhibition, and going behind-the-scenes in the National Herbarium. The RBG Board is most grateful to everyone who worked so effectively to ensure that the day was such a success.

Final plans are being settled for the collecting expedition to the Victoria River region of the Northern Territory. The RBG is collaborating with the Northern Territory Herbarium for this expedition, which commemorates the trek through that area by Ferdinand Mueller and the Gregory brothers in 1855. We particularly appreciate the Friends' generous donation of \$25,000 towards the costs of the expedition. It will last from 9 April to 23 April and six RBG staff will be participating. Two artists, Lin Onus and John Wolseley, and an Australian Geographic photographer and writer will also be accompanying the expedition.

GROWING FRIENDS SALE Saturday 23 March 10-00 - 4.00 Sunday 24 March 10.00 - 3.00 The Government's major 'gift' to the RBG for the 150th Anniversary – the Garden Gate developments at the Observatory site – is making steady progress.

The architects have begun detailed design work on the buildings and landscapes, and planning permits have been issued by the City of Melbourne and the Historic Buildings Council. The main construction works are likely to begin in August.

The RBG Board was saddened by the death of Dr James Willis AM in November 1995. He made a remarkable contribution to the National Herbarium and to botanical science during his life. The RBG has established the Jim Willis Fellowship Fund to commemorate the man and his achievements. The fellowship will be awarded annually to support the training of students in plant and fungal systematics. Mr Roger Riordan, Managing Director of Cybec Pty Ltd and a life-long friend of Jim Willis, has started the fund with a donation of \$20,000. The RBG is seeking to extend the capital base of the fund and welcomes donations from individuals or clubs and societies.

AUTUMN AT EMERALD, SASSAFRAS AND TECOMA

Bus Trip on Monday 22 April

Lysbeth and Bill Allison have invited the Friends to visit their Emerald garden which overlooks Cardinia Reservoir, and which will be full of autumn colour. Lysbeth and Bill tend their garden themselves and enjoy using only organic materials to nurture the plants.

After a short drive through the Dandenongs we shall have lunch at Chudleigh Park, Sassafras. Brian and Mary Metcalf have recently opened a gallery-tearoom in a setting of five acres of gardens. The gardens are landscaped into terraces, where superb specimens of sequoias, Douglas firs, English larch, yews, spruces, as well as rhododendrons, camellias and native ferns grow to perfection. Plants as tiny as the native violets and as large as the towering sequoias of 40-50 metres all thrive in the beautiful mountain soil, and native birds are attracted to the garden. Mary's father, Harry Myer, was in charge of the Director's 'vegie' garden and lived in E-gate Lodge during the time Mr Pescott was Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens.

Our next stop will be the George Tindale Memorial Gardens where we may stroll through eight acres of woodland garden. Plants are for sale there.

To round out the day, we'll stop in Tecoma to visit Horatio Jones's 'Kerosine Tin' house ... a place to stir the imagination - 'a tinpot palace; a triumph over hardship' - a poignant story. Listed on the Register of the National Estate, this home became an occasional retreat for some of the leading figures in Melbourne's arts community including Arthur Streeton, C.J.Dennis, Tom Roberts and Hepzibah Menuhin. Horatio Jones was friend and neighbour, as a boy, of Baron von Mueller and the house contains some pieces given to him by the Baron.

The bus will leave from the National Gallery, St Kilda Road at 9.00am sharp, to return at approximately 5.30pm. The all-inclusive charge for bus, morning tea, lunch and entrance fees will be \$33.



THE GARDENS ON CANVAS

Anne Marie Graham, at the age of 71, has set herself a workload that will keep her occupied well into the first decade of the 21st century.

As a labour of love, she has resolved to produce 100 oil paintings of the Royal Botanic Gardens in all seasons, and estimates an output of about 12 paintings a year. Twelve have already been completed and exhibited, while preparatory sketches have been done for another six. Anne is about to move house to live closer to her work.

Four of Anne's paintings have just been reproduced on blank greeting cards and will be on sale in the Friends' Shop; they depict the Oak Lawn in autumn, daffodils in spring, the Herb Garden and the paved lakeside area outside the Tea Rooms. The Gardens Shop will sell another of Anne's paintings: the Temple of the Winds, on a blank card.

Anne's magnum opus, a large triptych of the Gardens selected by John Truscott for the Victorian Arts Centre, will be familiar to many in poster or card form. Her distinctive style bears some relationship to naive art, but is more expressive. Anne confesses that she's not schooled in botanical names, but takes particular care about the details of plants; she tries to learn all she can about her subject before interpreting and stylising the essence of a scene. She likes to include people in her paintings.

Look out for new photographic postcards, too, produced by the Friends' Shop for the Gardens' sesquicentenary.

THE **OTHER** 1996 COMMEMORATION

On 10 October 1996, Australia Post and the German government are to jointly issue a postage stamp to commemorate the centenary of Ferdinand von Mueller's death.

A manager from Australia Post's Philatelic group was to have discussions in Germany at the end of February about the final details. RBG Librarian Helen Cohn and Sara Maroske from the Mueller Correspondence Project provided her with a wealth of information and images to assist the design process.

REMEMBERING JIM WILLIS

A host of material reflecting Dr Jim Willis's lifetime of work in botany has been donated by his family to the RBG library in the National Herbarium. There are diaries, reprints, notes of papers and talks, correspondence with many people, books and other items dating back to the 1930s.

The books are being incorporated into the general collection, and eventually all the material will be catalogued and available to researchers.

Desma Deans


We note with regret that one of our earliest Friends, Desma Deans, died last November.

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FROM THE GARDENS AND HERBARIUM

During the past two months major renovations have been carried out on the Ellis Stones Rockery beside the Lily Lake. Site conditions there, especially problems with drainage, have caused difficulties in recent years and handicapped our efforts to maintain the quality of the display. The rock-work has now been re-laid by Gordon Ford, who worked closely with Ellis Stones for many years in the design and construction of rockeries. In January the new beds were planted out with a blend of Australian and New Zealand species suited to the characteristics of the site. The Australian - New Zealand theme arises from the Rockery's location on the edge of the New Zealand collection and opposite the Australian Rainforest Walk.

The bust of Ferdinand Mueller has recently been re-erected in a new location – beside the path about 50 metres from F-Gate (opposite F-Gate Lodge). This site was chosen because it is close to the National Herbarium, which is Mueller's lasting legacy to the Royal Botanic Gardens and to botanical science in Australia. I believe it is important that the statue which commemorates the man and his achievements is close to the building housing so many of his plant specimens, books and memorabilia.

Plenty continues to happen at RBG Cranbourne. The dams for the four new lakes along Wylies Creek have been finished. The contractors have been particularly skilful in excavating the water-bodies without disturbing nearby bushland and grassland. The stop valves on the dams will be closed next month so that the autumn and winter rains will fill the lakes and create beautiful new views across the southern part of the Gardens. The lakes will be a key landscape feature of the Botanical Collection to be established there in the years ahead.

Work on the detailed design of the Australian Garden will take place over the next six months.

Taylor and Cullity Pty Ltd with Paul Thomson are continuing development of the exciting concepts for the 25-hectare garden contained in their 1995 Master Plan. We have also commissioned studies of the groundwater and earthworks for the new landforms and lakes in the garden. Plantings of local species around the perimeter of the garden are growing on vigorously, and we begin creating the Marsh Garden in March with funding from Melbourne Parks and Waterways.

Another focus of activity at Cranbourne is the construction of an expanded Nursery/Depot area. Plans for this are virtually complete. The service facilities will be concentrated on one site around the existing office, and for the first time Cranbourne staff will have appropriate propagation, nursery and storage facilities. Office accommodation will be extended by moving a demountable building no longer required at the Observatory site down to Cranbourne.

Several new staff have joined the RBG in the past few months. Carol Guthrie has joined Rod Dunstan in our Education Branch to share the teaching load for our thousands of enthusiastic school visitors. Carol is a teacher seconded by the Directorate of School Education. Sandra Beckwith was appointed Landscape Planner last December, and she is now working on the development of the Master Plan for RBG Melbourne. Michael McNabb will be Nursery Supervisor at South Yarra while Josie Vaganiance is on maternity leave for 12 months. Tracie Laws has been promoted to the position of Assistant Director, Public Programs. And to complete the staff news, Julie Goodall recently took up her appointment as part-time Volunteers Co-ordinator. She will be working with RBG support groups and others to expand both the opportunities for voluntary assistance and the numbers of volunteers helping us.
