NEW HERB GARDEN

The brickwork for the new herb garden, situated at the back of the nursery in the old medicinal plants area, is now complete, and planting of the area and its surrounds will begin this Spring. The garden has been designed as a formal sunken garden in a traditional pattern the shape of a wheel. The areas between the 'spokes' (paths) of the wheel will be planted with culinary herbs arranged according to botanical families. Around the garden will be sections of fragrant-flowered plants, medicinal plants, Australian herbs and fragrant-leaved plants. The Friends have donated \$1,000 towards the purchase of plants.

Leaving 'The Heights' we will be met at the Geelong Botanic Gardens by the Director, Mr. Ian Rogers, at 1.10 p.m., after which some of our Voluntary Guides have kindly offered to take us around the Gardens. We depart for Melbourne at 2.45 p.m. arriving back at the Herbarium at about 4.15 p.m.

The Geelong Gardens, established in 1857, will provide an interesting contrast to our Gardens. 'The Heights', built in 1855, is a mansion of great charm and character, with extensive outbuildings.

EXHIBITION OF BOTANICAL ART

A public exhibition of work by the well known artist Stan Kelly and by the National Herbarium's Botanical Illustrator, Anita Podwyszynski; Saturday, 19 October to Tuesday, 22 October, 10.00 a.m. — 4.30 p.m. Herbarium Auditorium, Birdwood Avenue, South Yarra, 3141.

The Exhibition will feature a selection of the most outstanding water colours used in Stan Kelly's publication Eucalypts, together with examples of his more recent paintings depicting the Fungi of Victoria.

In addition, water colours and pen and ink drawings by Anita Podwyszynski, eventually destined for the Herbarium's ambitious publication the Illustrated flora of Victoria, will be on display. (When completed, the flora will cover all native and naturalised plants in the State).

Friends are invited to the Exhibition's official opening by the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands on Friday 18 October. Following the opening, dinner will be served in the Astronomer's Residence and this will provide a special opportunity to meet the artists. (Please see the enclosed brochure for further details).

To complement the Exhibition, there will be an illustrated lecture on Fungi by Bruce Fuhrer, Zoology Department, Monash University, on Tuesday, 22 October at 5.30 p.m. in the Herbarium Auditorium. (As this will be the final day of the Exhibition, the artwork will remain on public display until after the lecture). Bruce Fuhrer is an outstanding natural history photographer and author and his superb slides are not to be missed.

SPRING IN THE GARDENS

Spring is here and our Gardens are alive with new colour. Some flowering plants are the 13 species listed below with the corresponding numbering on the map. There are many large groups of plants in flower such as the Flowering Peaches and Japanese Flowering Cherries (Prunus cvs.), Lilacs (Syringa cvs.) and Viburnium spp. It is also worth a visit to the Bulb Bed and the Magnolia Bed in early Spring.
