### **OBSERVATORY GATE**

Funding for Observatory Gate received a magnificent addition on 19 June when our Minister, Hon. Marie Tehan, announced a grant of \$2 million to the project from the Victorian Government through the Community Support Fund. The total funds available will now enable construction and landscaping to proceed. The Board has recently called tenders for the works and hopes that construction and renovations on the Observatory site will begin some time in September. Construction is planned for completion in mid-1998, followed by several months for landscaping and commissioning. The grand opening is scheduled for early 1999.

### FROM THE PRESIDENT

I'm particularly pleased to welcome David Adam to his new role of Chairman of the RBG Board, as he has been a member of the Friends for several years. We look forward to a continuing productive association with the Board.

In preparation for the commencement of work on the Observatory Gate project, we are scheduled to move from our present office to temporary accommodation in the Great Melbourne Telescope Building by 12 September. We expect it will be nine to twelve months before our new home, Observatory Lodge, is ready for occupation. In the meantime, access and space will be very limited, so we ask Friends needing to contact the office to do so by phone, mail or fax rather than in person, please.

During the winter months our Activities sub-committee organised an array of outstanding meetings for the Friends: Margaret Cone talking on 'The Symbolism of Flowers and Fruit as Depicted on Oriental Porcelain'; Terry Smyth describing her third visit to China on a plant collecting expedition; Michael McCoy, on the wonderful 'Hascombe' garden at Mount Macedon, and Wendy McRae on 'Antique Jewellery with a Botanical Theme'. I'm also delighted to report that a second Tasmanian trip in November was arranged to meet the demand, and two extra sessions filled for the State Library visits in August.

We are greatly indebted to our Activities sub-committee who arranged this program, and to our hard-working caterers who provide us with excellent refreshments. A special vote of thanks must go to Lesley Clark who, as convener of the sub-committee, has worked tirelessly on behalf of the Friends. Lesley has just returned from the Friends' trip to Costa Rica, and we look forward to hearing of her experiences.

Several months ago we witnessed a rare event - the publication of a *Draft Landscape Master Plan* for the RBG, the first for any major botanic garden in Australia. On behalf of the Friends I made a brief response, and we all look forward to the final version and its implementation.

I'm sure Members will have enjoyed reading the latest issue of *Botanic Magazine*, and on your behalf would like to express appreciation for all the voluntary work that went into its production - the writers, artists and photographers, the editor Heather Ironmonger, the advertising 'manager' Ellen Mercer and the the mailout team. We are very grateful to our advertisers whose support helps to defray the printing costs, and hope Friends will do business with them. Extra copies of *Botanic Magazine* may be purchased in the Friends' and Gardens' Shops.

Our distinguished Friend Dr Sophie Ducker was made a Member of the Order of Australia in the Queen's Birthday Honours, and Jocelyn Houghton, a very active Growing Friend, was recognised with a Medal of the Order of Australia for her service to Community Aid Abroad. On your behalf I sent congratulations to both these members.

David Wilkinson, a former Friends' president, has just returned from two years in France.

### PLANTS OF THE SUB-ANTARCTIC ISLANDS AND ANTARCTICA Illustrated Talk by Janet Limb

Tuesday 28 October from 10.15am Mueller Hall, National Herbarium

Janet Limb will give an illustrated talk about a 25-day expedition and cruise in which she participated, to explore the sub-Antarctic islands and Commonwealth Bay. Janet's trip included Mawson's hut, the Mertz Glacier and Macquarie Island.

The flora and fauna of these remote islands are particularly interesting; magnificent mega-herbs like *Stilbocarpa polaris* and *Pleurophyllum hookerii* were just some of the plants she observed.

Janet, a member of the Friends, worked as a volunteer guide at the Zoo for 12 years. As a result, she developed a strong interest in the inter-relationship between plants and animals, their evolution and adaptation to their environment.

### MUELLER-INSPIRED GARDENS Bus trip on Thursday 30 October

We will visit three gardens in the Healesville area which were influenced by Baron von Mueller - *Tara Rise*, *The Hermitage* and *St Fillans*.

We are most fortunate to have the company of John Hawker, a Friends Councillor and Horticulturalist with Heritage Victoria who was involved in setting up the National Trust's Register of Significant Trees.

Leaving the National Gallery at 9.00am sharp, we will travel to Healesville where we will have refreshments at Grandma's Kitchen. Not far away is *Tara Rise*, owned by Bruce and Betty Lockwood. The original cottage, still standing, is more than 100 years old; the present home was built in 1936. The garden is noted for its great Californian redwoods and Himalayan cedars.

Following a trip to England and Europe in 1990 the Lockwoods were inspired to create extra features in the garden, such as two small lakes (now home to many species of ducks) connected by a bridge, a knot garden, a Laburnum walk, a fernery and an orchid house.

We will have lunch at our next stop, *The Hermitage* at Narbethong. *The Hermitage*, a pleasure resort built in 1894 by the internationally-renowned photographer John William Lindt, is now owned by Val and John Stafford, who offer bed and breakfast accommodation. Mueller, as President of the Royal Geographical Society and friend of Lindt, officially opened *The Hermitage* in the year before he died. The property is included in the Victorian Heritage Register, and Baron von Mueller is reputed to have designed the landscape layout. Two trees on the property are listed on the National Trust's Significant Tree Register - a Mountain Grey Gum (*Eucalyptus cypellocarpa*) measuring 10.8m in girth, and the largest and oldest *Cryptomeria japonica 'Elegans'* known in Victoria, with a girth of 3.6m.

Nearby *St Fillans*, owned by Helen and Rex Goulding, is another beautiful and historic garden which has nine superb classified trees.

### SPRING IN THE SEYMOUR / YEA AREA BUS TRIP TO HISTORIC PROPERTIES -HABBIES HOWE AND MURRUNDINDI Thursday 13 November

Leaving the National Gallery, St Kilda Road, at 9.00am sharp, we firstly visit *Habbies Howe*, a 750-hectare farm set in a beautiful valley just out of Seymour and owned by Anita Simon (a Friend) and her husband Henry. Here we will have coffee/tea before our guided tour. The house was built in 1842 from bricks kiln-fired on the property. The old garden had a lot of stonework done in the 1920s (the owners think by Edna Walling). November is a lovely time to visit, with spring flowers and white wisteria.

We will have lunch at Marmalades in Yea, a classified building which still has the counters, flour bins and fixtures from its original life as Purcell's Grocery Store, built 1887. Then we'll move on to *Murrundindi Station* (c1847), also classified by the National Trust, and owned by David Adams. There is an old homestead, the original small stone cottage, the stable and coach house, the woolshed and a cypress-hedged rose garden. *Murrundindi Station* was sold to Harry Campbell Gordon in 1912 and much of the present beauty must be attributed to this man. In 1965 the property was purchased by Stanley Livingstone who also contributed to the improvement and maintenance of the estate.

We should return to the National Gallery at approximately 5.30pm.

### MUELLER'S TABLE

The Director has acquired an antique table, once owned by Baron von Mueller, with \$4,050 remaining unallocated from the proceeds of the 1996 Grand Ball. The table will be an important addition to the RBG's collection of Mueller memorabilia and will be displayed in Gardens House. It has been in the collection of the Friends of Horatio Jones; it is uncertain whether Mueller gave the table to Jones in his lifetime or bequeathed it to him.

### **GUILFOYLE AWARDS**

Guilfoyle Awards have been presented to SANDRA BECKWITH, Landscape Planner, for her outstanding performance in planning and producing the draft Master Plan for RBG Melbourne, and LOUISE RUGGIERO for her exceptional customer service in the Gardens' Shop. The Team Award was won by the group who co-ordinated the development of the RBG's Certified Agreement (a workplace agreement on staff conditions and salaries): Cathryn Coles, Stephen May, Patricia Quinn, Peter Symes and Colin Walker. These Awards, now in their third year, recognise outstanding achievements by RBG staff.

### ALGAE

Two former Herbarium staff members, Doris Sinkora and Helen Aston, have had the rare honour of having new genera named after them. *Astonia*, a new genus in the family Alismataceae occurring in Cape York, was named after Helen in recognition of her distinguished record in studies of Australian aquatic plants. For Doris, who curated the algae collection, it's *Sinkoreana*, a genus of red algae which occurs from Japan to South-eastern Australia.

While on the subject of algae, RBG staff members Tim Entwisle and Simon Lewis, together with Jason Sonneman of Monash University, have just produced *Freshwater Algae in Australia* - a world first. It's an easy-to-use guide, with more than 300 colour photographs, line drawings and simple illustrated keys to aid identification. Production of the book has been generously supported by the R E Ross Trust. The book is available in both soft and hardcover at the Gardens' Shop.

### HERBARIUM STAFF IN PRINT

At the beginning of September we hail the achievement of Dr Roger Spencer as copies of his *Horticultural Flora of South-eastern Australia, Volume 2* arrive from the publishers, University of NSW Press. Covering 74 families of popular flowering plants and many tree groups, this planned four-volume reference series represents the prodigious horticultural knowledge which Roger is able to impart as Senior Botanist at the RBG.

Another important recent publication is the *Catalogue* and *Bibliography of Australian Macrofungi Vol. 1* by Dr Tom May. It appears in the new *Fungi of Australia* series - the fungi equivalent of a Flora. The previous comprehensive catalogue of fungi was published in 1895. Tom says that in the intervening century there's been about a two-fold increase in numbers of recognised species, but it is known that there are many fungi 'out there' still to be discovered and catalogued.

Jeffrey Jeanes has just produced a revised nomenclature for *Orchids of Australia*.

### FIRE BLIGHT

Further laboratory testing, both in Australia and Germany, has confirmed the presence of the fire blight bacterium, *Erwinia amylovora*, in three plants at RBG Melbourne. These plants have been removed, together with another 15 or so nearby susceptible plants, as a precaution. More precautionary removals are being undertaken to limit the opportunities for the bacterium to spread.

Plant pathologists are stressing that although the causative organism has been isolated in Melbourne (and also in Adelaide Botanic Gardens), no outbreaks of fire blight disease have been found. This is unusual. It may be because the bacterial strain is benign, or is inhibited by other micro-organisms, or is subject to sub-optimal environmental conditions. Research is continuing to investigate those possibilities. The German fire blight expert, Prof Klaus Geidar, who visited RBG Melbourne on 3 July, has not previously encountered a situation where Erwinia amylovora is present but there has been no generalised outbreak of fire blight disease.

RBG staff continue to work closely with Agriculture Victoria officers in monitoring the susceptible plants and in arranging additional surveys of the Gardens and surrounding areas in spring. The flowering of susceptible plants and warmer spring weather provide better conditions for the growth of *Erwinia* and the possible appearance of fire blight disease.

Enquiries about fire blight should continue to be made to Agriculture Victoria at Knoxfield.

### FROM THE GARDENS AND HERBARIUM

The Draft Landscape Master Plan for RBG Melbourne received general approval, including a very positive public meeting on 28 May. Twenty-nine submissions were made, including one from the Friends Council. The submissions raised several issues about some specific proposals in the plan, but the broad thrust of the plan and its recognition of the heritage values of the Gardens have been widely supported. We are now evaluating the points made in the submission, in collaboration with the Reference Panel of external experts. Once this is done we will have the final version of the Master Plan completed in 3-4 months, when we can begin implementing it.

Down at Cranbourne, we expect that the Environmental Effects Study into the proposed East-West Road Link will be released any day. Two of the options being considered for a four-lane arterial road - both in the Ballarto Road 'corridor' - would have highly damaging impacts on the wetlands, bushlands and plants and animals in the northern part of RBG Cranbourne. Significant lengths of both road options would cut a swathe through the Gardens. Other sections would be within a few metres of the new Australian Garden, greatly diminishing visitors' enjoyment of it. We will need the Friends' help collectively and individually - to make sure these road options are firmly rejected by the Government. I will keep you posted about the outcome of the study and the assistance needed from you.

Still at Cranbourne – but good news this time. We have recently welcomed Andrew Grant as the first Assistant Director (Cranbourne Gardens). The growth in the

volume and scope of activities at Cranbourne has necessitated establishing it as a new Division in RBG's structure. Andrew is a botanist by training and joins us from Parks Victoria and the Department of Natural Resources and Environment. Interviews have been completed for the inaugural Director of the Australian Research Centre for Urban Ecology, which is being established at Cranbourne with funding from the Baker Foundation.

Andrew Laidlaw has been appointed Landscape Planner at RBG Melbourne, following Sandra Beckwith's departure to work overseas. Stephen May resigned as Business Manager recently to take up an appointment as finance manager of a suburban shopping centre development. We wish Sandra and Stephen well in their future careers. Damien Adams has been appointed to succeed Stephen May as Business Development Manager.

We have been pleased to welcome back Dr Jim Grimes, our 1996 inaugural Mueller Fellow, who has now left the New York Botanical Garden to take up a position at RBG Melbourne as a Senior Botanist. And we say bon voyage to Education Officer Rod Dunstan who leaves on 20 September for three and a half months in the USA, UK and Germany on a Churchill Fellowship.

We've come to expect outdoor theatrical productions in the Gardens during summer; now there's an indoor winter season of drama in the Herbarium Hall. The Vault Theatre Company will present Camille until 20 September at 8.15pm from Tuesday to Saturday and 6.15pm on Sundays. Bookings are essential on 9685 5111.
