Works by Jenny Phillips, Colin Woolcock and Celia Rosser were exhibited and the event was well received by the public. Another major event will be the opening of the new Herb Garden during November for which the Friends provided \$2 500 for plants and labels. The publication of the first issue of Botanic magazine, a journal of botanical and horticultural interest with particular reference to our Botanic Gardens. is a significant achievement for the year. THE NEW HERB GARDEN

The new Herb Garden in the Melbourne Botanic Gardens is now open to visitors. The beds between the wheel's paved spokes display a fascinating range of culinary herbs, arranged according to botanical families. The surrounding beds contain collections of Australian herbs, fragrant and medicinal herbs. PAST ACTIVITIES

May we add our comments to those of our President re the Botanical Art Exhibition. From the official opening on Friday October 10 to closing time on Sunday October 19 the Exhibition proved stimulating and rewarding in every possible way — culturally, socially, financially too — a wonderful show-case for two very talented illustrators, Jenny Phillips and Colin Woolcock. We had marvellous help from a host of diverse people, both Friends and otherwise, all of whom helped to ensure the Exhibition's outstanding success.

In September Dr Sophie Ducker told us of the System Garden at Melbourne University and Miss Erica Mooney spoke about the Besler Botanicals, both events of great interest to those members able to attend.



THE SUMMER WALK

Summer is the time to visit the Gardens to fully appreciate its shady havens and sprawling lawns. This walk begins at the Oak Lawn close to the Herbarium.

A walk across the Oak Lawn to the Princes Lawn and the beautiful blue-mauve flowers of the Jacaranda mimosifolia come into view. On the other side of the path is the majestic Golden Chalic Vine, Solandra maxima and on the edge of the Princes Lawn, towards the Fern Gully, are fuchsias displaying beautiful colours of pink, mauve and red.

Continuing on into the Fern Gully, the hot sun is soon forgotten with the native and exotic ferns and palms providing a refreshing rain forest setting.

The Ornamental Lake is cooling and restful to visit. Surrounding the Lake on the Alexandra Avenue and 'H' Gate side is a beautiful display of hydrangeas. The summer breeze carries with it the lovely scent of the Ginger Lily which along with Acanthus mollis, Bear's Breeches and Agapanthus praecox ssp. orientalis, surround the Lake.

The Canna Beds, situated at the Nareeb Gates and on the Southern Lawn, offer a colourful display and a pleasant backdrop for photographs.

A walk along the Australian Border is quite colourful. Hibbertia scandens with its bright yellow flowers adds colour to the ground. The creamy flowers of Backhousia anisata can soon be seen through the trees and a little further on the beautiful scarlet flowers of Eucalyptus ficifolia. One of the few Australian species of Hibiscus is situated at the 'F' Gate end of the Australian Border. The large white flowers with their red throats are worth viewing. A little further on is a specimen of Castanospermum australe with its striking yellow flowers which later turn orange-red. A fine specimen of Brachychiton acerifolium is also found here.

One tree which is a must for the summer walk is Magnolia grandiflora. Situated on the Southern Lawn opposite the Magnolia Bed, its perfumed, creamy white flowers are striking. Following the left fork in the path the newly designed and re-developed Rose Garden comes into view.
